Been There, Done That

<u>Pisa</u>

Back in July of 2013, Pat and I took a trip to Italy, a place I had wanted to visit since I was a kid, and I was going to get the opportunity to do so!

One of the places that we stopped at was Pisa, to see the leaning tower of Pisa. Construction of the tower began in 1173 and ended somewhere between 1360 to 1370. It is a marble bell tower that unfortunately was constructed on unstable ground. It leans 14½ feet (4.4 meters) out of line when measured from the seventh story.



The tower is 51 feet (15.5 meters) in diameter and 180 feet (55 meters) tall. The walls are 13 feet (4 meters) thick at the base and 6 to 7 feet (1.8 to 2.1 meters) thick at the top. There are 15 arches that surround it on the ground floor. Thirty arches encircle the next 6 stories. The top story with the bell tower has 12 arches. The inner staircase has 300 steps.



The etower was closed for repairs in 1990. At the time, the tower was leaning 1/20 inch per year. Engineers stabilized the tower by straightening it 15 inches to prevent its collapse, and it reopened in 2001.

The stamp at the top, showing the leaning tower of Pisa is Italy Scott# 1117, issued on October 8, 1973 for the 800 year anniversary of the tower.

Newsletter Volume Dilemma

The following issues of stamping are missing:

- 1986 Volume 1 Numbers 2, 3, 4, 5 (May to August issues)
- 1991 Volume 6 Number 11 (November)
- 1992 Volume 7 Year starts with as Volume 7 issue Nr.
 1 in March, so most likely there were no issues in January or February. However, starting in October, the volume number reverts back to 6!
- 1993 Volume 7 Issue 11 (December). Note: this year had the wrong "volume" being used, it should have been 8, therefore every successive volume is off by 1!
- 1997 Volume 10 another year of an erroneous volume, number, as "volume 10 was also used in 1996!

So, in reviewing the volume numbers, we are off by quite a few! In 1976, there was a "volume 1", then no newsletters apparently until 1986, when "volume 1" was used again. Plus since 1986, some volume numbers were used in repeating years (1992 and 1997).

Thus, starting with 1976, as volume 1, 1986 should have been volume 2, 1987 volume 3, etc. Moving forward to 2017, the "real" volume number this year should be "33" (not "30"). When I spoke with one of the employees at the Wineburgh Philatelic Library about this, he advised to just keep the current numbering scheme as it is.

The Case of the Prostitute's Bag: Another Philatelic Mystery Solved

While browsing through a box of covers at TEXPEX, I

three envelopes found with unusual markings that I had never seen before. All were brightly colored and labeled with the name of a journal or newspaper (Journal LA FRANCE, L'Ouest-Éclair) and the name of a railroad station (Gare Bordeaux-Saint-Jean, Gare Rennes). But the most striking aspect of these covers were the words 'HORS SAC' on their fronts in very large print. I thought there might be a story here, so I bought the covers (all three for \$5.00) and did some investigating. Several of the covers are shown nearby.

First of all I needed to find out what 'HORS SAC' meant. My French was rusty. I studied it in school but about all I remembered was 'Voulez-vous coucher avec moi?' and this article is not going there. So I used my trusty google translator, and found that 'HORS SAC' meant 'out of the bag' or in the philatelic sense it referred to an item carried outside of the regular (sealed) mailbags. Sort of like the military term 'hors de combat' meaning 'out of action due to injury or damage.' An internet search yielded little additional information.

So I went to the APS library and searched their online catalog. I found three short articles which I could use (all written by Jean-Luc Trassaert). I called the library and spoke with Fred Baumann. Several hours later all three articles arrived by email, for a total cost of \$6.50. The APS library is truly an amazing resource, not only because of its vast holdings, but because it's staffed by some incredible people, many of whom are volunteers.

So here's the story. The French people, like many of us, enjoy reading their newspapers in the morning with their coffee and croissants. Most newspapers in France in the latter half of the nineteenth century were printed at night and placed on trains (usually with railway postal cars) to be delivered to various cities. Speed was of the essence, and it would certainly speed

things up if the papers did not have to go through the local post office on arrival. So starting in 1854, the French postal service allowed some newspapers to be picked up at the railway stations. This material was carried out of the sealed mailbag (HORS SAC) and each bundle of newspapers was tied together with a colorful tag franked with postage for the entire bundle. So if there were twenty papers, and the postal rate was one-half centime each, the tag had to be franked with ten centimes. These tags are avidly collected and can be quite expensive.

Later this service was extended to almost all items associated with newspaper production, such as printers proofs, news articles, journalistic correspondence, and illustrations. The items had to be placed in special colored envelopes (such as those shown here) marked 'HORS SAC' and were charged the regular postage rate plus a surcharge for the special service. After the 1940s the envelopes had to bear the name of the sender, the date, hour and place of mailing, and the sender's signature. One of the nearby covers shows this feature.

I imagine (this is pure speculation) that there was a row of post office boxes in the train station. When the train arrived the postal officials put the mail marked 'HORS SAC' into those boxes so it could be picked up by the local newspapers' agents without having to go through the local post office, this allowing the good people of France to have the latest news with their morning coffee.

So there you have it. I apologize for the terrible pun in the title of this article.

US Postal Service

In the summer of 2003, I decided to make a career change. I had been in sales for nearly thirty years and was beginning to suffer from burn-out. It was time to do something different. At the time, my niece was going out with a man who was a mail carrier with the U.S. Postal Service. I jokingly said to him "I need to get a nice easy government job like you have". He told me to go take the test that they give for mail carriers. After thinking about it, I decided to take the test

since I had nothing to lose.

I hired on as a rural carrier associate, which is a substitute on a rural route. The first stamp shown is USA Scott#2420, issued on August 30, 1989. I was assigned to a route at the North Richland Hills post office. When the regular carrier for that route



was off, I carried the mail that day. Not all routes had a substitute, so on other days I would do other routes. I was also sent to other post offices in the Ft. Worth area.

After a little more than three years, I got my own route. Routes open up when people retire or new sub-divisions go u with more houses. The first route I had was out of the North Richland Hills post office. That route did not have a postal vehicle, so I had to use my own vehicle. I bought a Ford Explorer from a man in Gainesville who put the right hand drive in for me.

The second stamp shows USA Scott#1498, issue on



April 30, 1973 and shows a mail carrier in a personal vehicle delivering the mail.

After a few years, I as able to transfer to the Cityview post office which is closer to my house. That route had over 600 houses on it, but it was all sub-divisions in the city, even though it was a rural route. I retired on September 30, 2014.

BOD Meeting Minutes - May 20, 2017

- A discussion was held concerning the apparent demise of the TEXPEX show and whether or not the MCSC should be involved in trying to help keep it afloat. The general consensus was that we should not get involved at this time.
- 3. Ray brought up the question of buying extra frames from TEXPEX if they became available, and this proposal was placed on hold for the present.
- 4. Ray brought up the question of publicity for the MCSC Library. Janet & Ray Moyer volunteered to work with the club librarian (Rich Hildebrandt) to sort through our books and make a list which could be sent to members.
- 5. There was a discussion about continuing to schedule Meet & Eats at Campo Verde. It was decided to continue doing so.
- 6. Alliene Franklin asked for help putting ribbons on the exhibits. Rich Hildebrandt volunteered to work with her.
- 7. Ray announced the results of the Linn's stamp preference poll, and said there were three tied winners: Ben Termini, Peter Elias and Ken Wills.

New Business:

- 1. Peter Elias discussed the "volume" numbering of previous issues of the newsletter which was all mixed up (this happened before he became editor).
- Peter discussed running a survey of the membership regarding preferences for activities at meetings. He agreed to collect the surveys, analyze the data, and supervise the awarding of prizes for members who completed the survey. Various members of the board contributed their comments on the contents of the survey.
- 3. Skip Ely reported that sales from the stamp books were slowing down and he expected to run a deficit of about \$100 for this year. He mentioned that he was thinking about discontinuing books from the APS.
- 4. Ben Termini passed around a card that the club had received from the wife of recently deceased member Bill Bradshaw.

NEW PROSTITUTE REVENUE CATALOG AVAILABLE

CATALOG OF SANITARY SERVICE STAMPS, VETERINARY INSPECTION STAMPS and TUBERCULINIZATION STAMPS ISSUED by the CITY OF ROSARIO de SANTA FE, ARGENTINA.

As part of a program to control the spread of venereal disease, the City of Rosario, in the Argentine province of Santa Fe, issued revenue stamps (Sanitarios) to pay the fee for mandatory twice-weekly examinations of registered prostitutes. Each prostitute was given a booklet in which the examination results were recorded. The prostitute (or the madam) had to purchase Sanitarios to pay for the examinations.

This catalog covers the entire time period during which these stamps were issued (1893 to 1928), including all known varieties, examination result markings, and overprints. Also included in the catalog are a few stamps of similar design which were issued to pay for veterinary inspections and vaccination against tuberculosis.

From the President's Table

The American Philatelic Society, APS) does more than offer a long string of services to collectors, but they offer help to clubs as well. I just received meeting notes from an APS Ambassador Call-in which lists some of the ideas that came in from other clubs about picking up new members and publicizing their club and shows. Here are a few examples of the responses that other APS active members gave that could be pertinent to the Mid-Cities Stamp Club.

John from Buffalo NY wrote: Our club decided to advertise their show in non-stamp collecting venues, such as a local bowling paper and on a flyer for Bingo etc. He estimates that they had about a 40% increase in the number of show attendees. People said they saw the ad and had not collected for years, or that their father collected and they decided to visit the show. John (evidently a dealer as well as a member) bought four nice collections from people brought in by the publicity and the club also signed up some new club members. "Clubs tend to preach to the choir using traditional stamp collecting venues, but they see results in "going outside the circle" to reach people who might resurrect their collections and bring them into the hobby", he added. A show he does in Ohio advertises in a local fireman's paper which has also generated some new customers for him along with potential club members. He also commented that by changing their meeting start time from 7:30 PM to 7:00 PM made an impact on attendance in that members saw that they could get home earlier after the meetings. He added that "time" is a major factor as well.

Jim from the Southern Nevada Stamp Club sets up a booth at coin shows and they obtain a room for teaching the Boy Scouts of America Stamp Collecting Merit Badge. They rubber stamp the blank APS flyers they hand out with their club name and information and the club gets credit and a cash incentive for each member they bring in to the APS.

Chris from the (California) Sequoia Stamp Club stated that the club has a \$500 scholarship that is administered through the local public schools for seniors who have any type of collecting interest. He also said that the club goes out to where other groups are, not settling for just trying to get them to come to the club's meetings and show. He suggested getting a table at local festivals, farmer's markets or other local community activities and also that the club get active on social media sites as a means to reach out to younger people. (Note: We've tried that with the Waxahachie Chautauqua for two years, but need to find venues within the metroplex).

Tom from the Knoxville (TN) Philatelic Society added that members drop off their older copies of the American Philatelist in doctor's offices. (Note: that could go with copies of Linn's, Topical Time, The Texas Philatelist, American Stamp Dealer and Collector Magazine, Stamping Around, etc. I drop

For <u>ANNOUNCEMENTS</u>, Brian noted that there were several tables of free periodicals and individual sales items for members to browse.

He urged that next time members bring items for the new collectors table and club "mystery box" at the November EXPO. The May meeting will feature the third installment of the Donohoo estate materials and will be announced for May 23, 24, or 25, depending on scheduling with the Bentwater Center.

In <u>SHOW & TELL</u>, Ray Cartier circulated a sample of the plastic used for balloon atmospheric research. Karen Cartier had copies of her new book "Tales by Mail." Gary McNamee had an antique stamp album and Bob Coleman showed off a 1948 Scott catalog. Daniel Kennedy brought an unusual Japanese "peso", which was used during the occupation of the Philippines.

After the **BREAK** with one of Al Hull's chocolate cakes, Ray Cartier discussed precursors to his space exploration collection. Beginning with balloon flights as early 1782 and their utility in the Franco-Prussian War a century later, he concentrated on developments of the early-to-mid 20th century. Ray's collections are in and of themselves eyepopping but his knowledge of the history of lighter-than-air flight is unsurpassed. Costs, depression, and war brought an end to the fascination by the late 1930s.

In <u>CONCLUSION</u>, gift certificate door prizes went to Gene Atkinson and Gary McNamee.

some of mine off from time to time at the library or the dentist's office.) Kristen, from the Sequoia Stamp club also drops them off in car repair or inspection facility's waiting rooms. Schloss ("Castle") Oberhofen is a really neat little castle located on the shores of Lake Thun in central Switzerland.


My wife and I were driving towards the city of Thun in 2000 and decided to check it out.

It's not a really big castle (like the ones you can find in England), but it has a lot of really



wonderful items to view, especially incredible stained glass, such as the photo from below shows. The picture of us is on the castle grounds, in what would be to the right side of the stamp shown above.

The stamp shown is a Swiss "Pro Patria" semi-postal stamp issued by Switzerland in May 2017. "Pro Patria" means "for one's country". If you ever go to Switzerland, a visit to the Oberhofen castle should be on your to-do list!

"The Evolution of Mail and Postage Stamps" is the http://www.frontiernet.net/ subject of this website: ~stamptmf/exhibits/stampcollecting/. It is 37 pages of very interesting reading and I highly recommend that you read it, perhaps even pass it on to non-collector friends! I've turned this entire webpage into a 37-pages PDF file (which is about 10 MB in size) to make it easier to print or to pass on to others.

Regardless of the "name" of a website, they are all assigned an "IP Address" (internet protocol). The name of the website ("something.com" for example, doesn't tell you where it is at), however, if you know the IP address where the website is located (or from where an email message originated), then you can find out physically where that IP address is located!


For example, I sent a message to the Mid-Cities Stamp Club "YahooGroup" that I use for storing the club's newsletters. The resulting email that I received (since I'm also on that list, says that the email was received from IP address 98.138.101.141.

I then went to a website called www.utrace.de and typed in the IP address into the box and the result is this:

While it may be hard to read the screen shot above, but it shows that this IP address resolves to Yahoo! In Sunnyvale, California and would prove that email originates from where it says it does! Utrace.de is a website in Germany, but you can switch to English at the top; I use this site all the time to help determine whether email message originate from they say they do. So if you get a message from "Bank of America", but the email's originating IP address is in Romania for example, then more than likely it's not from Bank of America!

Been There, Done That

On our trip to Italy in 2013, one of the stops was Assisi. The picture below is of the Basilica of San Francesco (St. Francis). It is named for the founder of the Franciscan Order, St. Francis of Assisi, who lived from 1182 to 1226.



His real name was Giovanni Bernadone, whose father was a wealthy cloth merchant. Francis' religious conversion came about after an encounter with a leper. Francis believed he had a call from God to repair the church near Assisi.

In 1208 he renounced all of his belongings, including his clothing. He accepted poverty in imitation of Chris. His final years were spent in prayer and solitude. Francis died on October 3, 1226. In 1228, the Catholic Church canonized him, declaring him a saint. His feast day is October 4. The USA stamp featuring Assisi is Scott #2023, issued on October 7, 1982.

Philatelic Sleuthing: Spalen

Club member John Barrett knows that I speak German and asked if I could help him figure out what "Spalen" means on the lower ring of the postmark (see cover below). The other word "Aussere" (actually Äussere) means "Outer", but "Spalen" is not in any dictionary. Now what?

Google to the rescue! I googled (yes, that's a verb now...) "Äusser Spalen Basel" and ended up at a Wikipedia website about Basel's ancient city gates, one of which was "Spalentor" (Spalen Gate); perhaps "Spalen" on the postmark is an abbreviation for "Spalentor"? I googled further, trying "Basel 9 postamt" ("9" is a branch number, "postamt" means "post office" in German) and ended up at a Google listing for the post office "9", which is right next to a street called

"Spalenring".

So all of this then would confirm that "Äussere Spalen" on the postmark refers to the name of the post office branch. When researching, I can highly recommend using Google!
