Newsletter Gets Vermeil Award

The stamp shown to the right, Singapore Scott #442, issued on August 9, 1984 shows the "Merlion", the symbol of Singapore. The idea of the Merlion, a mythical creature with a lion's head and the body of a fish was created by the Singapore Tourism Board in 1964. It was designed and sculpted by Lim Nang Seng to be the mascot for the city. It is the most popular tourist attraction in Singapore.

Each year the APS has a "Chapter Newsletter Competition". We entered the newsletter for 2016 and it received a Vermeil level award. That's somewhat unusual, as it had been Gold for many years, and I have made improvements based on judges comments.

Due to the fact that our club makes the newsletter publicly accessible to anyone on the planet (not just members), there are some issues regarding privacy (such as listing members' and club officer's phone numbers and email addresses). Even if home addresses are not shown in the newsletter, since as we know, there are many websites that let you "reverse lookup" a phone number and come up with the address! I do enclose a "note to the judges" explaining why some things are the way they are.

Several judges evaluated our newsletter; here are the highlights of their comments: *meeting notices were present, but did not include a description of what to expect, the program; club needs were scant and buried in President's letter; member recognition is excellent; did not see mention of new members; photos were relevant and nicely balanced; too much space devoted to minutes; article index is a nice touch; masthead is attractive; font sometimes small for older eyes; some of the illustrations are fuzzy; bonus points for profiles, ads, cartoons and good philatelic articles; lots of minutes—need more articles; consider having title & logo in color; inconsistent numbers [editor : huh?]; missing punctuation, look up rule on who vs. that; add info on social media accounts [editor: the club doesn't have any]; ads & classifieds look cluttered & messy with mixed color; bonus points members' ads and cartoons.*

Editor’s Forum

New this month is a “member survey” (see page 3). The club would like your feedback on a number of issues. The last time this was done was in 1995/1996 based on a similar survey that I found in my archives.

Please mail this survey back to me at the address shown on the survey form (same as the return address for this newsletter) so that it arrives on or before July 19. Please do NOT mail the survey to the club’s address in Arlington, as that would delay getting it to me, possibly even after the deadline. I do on occasion attend the Arlington & Euless meetings and you can try to give the survey in person, but I can’t guarantee that I can make it to the July meetings. I will then tabulate the results and hope to have those published in the August newsletter.

As an incentive, the club is offering a “door prize” drawing of a \$10 certificate for every 10 eligible surveys received (so for example, if we receive 30 surveys, this will result in 3 certificates to be drawn); so basically, your chances are 1 in 10 !

Also, at the last BOD / EXPO meeting, it was decided that the club’s “door prize certificates” are ALSO valid with the dealer’s at the TSDA Richardson bourses; this way you won’t have to wait to use them at EXPO dealers (or at club meetings for purchases from the Club or APS Sales Books). Think about it: with a \$10 certificate, you could buy at least \$10 in mint USA postage from the dealers !

When submitting stamps, or images of stamps, for articles, please use “mint”, not used stamps. Unfortunately many times, the postmarks will obscure some or much of the design (which is of course what we want to illustrate - unless it is of course the postmark that is the subject). If you can’t find a mint version of the stamp, there are several other choices. For the more common USA stamps (ie: starting in the 1930’s), I probably have a mint copy from my own collection that I can use and scan, for other stamps, we might be able to find an image on the internet somewhere (<https://images.google.com/> is a good place to start). If using an image from the internet, we would have to acknowledge the source of the image in the article.

Coffee With A View

Are The Killers Hiding?

Many of us enjoy coffee. Much of the coffee served isn't that good. Not that the beans aren't good, primarily I've found that there's not enough coffee grounds used to make the coffee! In other words, if I can see through it as its' being poured, it's dishwasher as far as I'm concerned... such as in your average office break room. Luckily that has changed in the past few years...

For me, quality coffee requires:

1. A fine grind, thus more surface area is exposed and the more contact water makes with the coffee.
2. Using more coffee grinds. I've seen way too many times that there just isn't enough coffee put into the filter basket.
3. A quality roast. That's more of a personal preference. It can range from mild (light colored) roasted beans to heavy roasts, such as are used in espresso and cappuccino coffees; these beans are generally almost black and have an "oily" look to them. I prefer a dark roast and a fine grind!

Coffee bean origin is of course important as well, that can range from places such as South America, Africa and Indonesia (home of "Java"). Personally, I like Jamaica Blue Mountain coffee and Hawaiian Kona the best and Italy & Switzerland rank as some of the best places to buy coffee in restaurants, England not so much (I speak with experience!). On the other hand, I was in a hotel on Trinidad in 1999, and they served "instant" coffee!

A few years back, I was in Kingston, Jamaica on a business trip and took a drive into the blue mountains and also ended up buying a couple of bags of Blue Mountain coffee at a local grocery store (where it was considerably cheaper than at the airport!). You gotta shop where the locals go!

What turned me on to "good coffee" to begin with was a couple of roommates in college that took me to a coffee store to buy various blends and teaching me to use the proper amount of coffee using Melitta filters and a carafe.

As they say in the real estate business: "location, location, location". In the summer of 2013, we visited Switzerland and did a brief day-hike to scenic Sertig Dörfli (a small village at the end of the Sertig valley near Davos). Looking at THAT view on a beautiful day and enjoying a great cup of Swiss coffee ... I mean, what could be better? ... Sigh ... wish I could be there now!



Traditionally, US postmarks have consisted of two parts: the date stamp and what is called a killer. The idea was for the date stamp to be on a clear part of the envelope so that it could be read, and the killer would cancel the stamp so that it could not be reused. The killers evolved from bars and wavy lines to slogans and seasonal messages. Last year's 'seasons greetings' was indeed a killer:



Perhaps the USPS listened to stamp collectors' complaints, as they seem to have eliminated the killer portion of the cancel altogether:



It's a little mysterious that the USPS is no longer concerned that people will soak off uncanceled stamps and reuse them, even though that is actually illegal. Could it be that the switch from self-adhesive stamps with a water soluble layer to ones which cannot be soaked off has convinced the post office officials that reuse is no longer possible?

MCSC EXPO Meeting Minutes May 20, 2017

The MCSC EXPO Committee met at The Pizza Garden in Bedford 12:30 AM on May 20, 2017 (A BOD meeting preceded the EXPO meeting). Present were EXPO Chairperson Ralph Poore, Treasurer Judy Christmas, and Committee members Stanley Christmas, Tom Cunningham, Peter Elias, Bob Weidman, Rich Hildebrandt, Mike Smith, Ken Wills, Ray and Janet Moyer, Ray Cartier, and Skip Ely.

- **BOURSE** - The meeting began with Tom Cunningham reviewing the dealer participants and their locations at EXPO. Four dealers at previous EXPOs will not return, but Tom has five new dealers lined up. He said the move of the Beginner's table and Chance Board to the foyer, and space vacated from dealers not returning, means he doesn't need the space currently occupied by the Exhibits (so no extra room required). He mentioned that one dealer will need some labor to help with moving her stock contained in filing cabinets.
- **EXHIBITS** - Stanley Christmas said he would have prospectus's available by the end of the month, but already had several frames filled.
- **FRAMES** - Stanley noted that Evan Islam had offered to furnish a truck for transporting the frames from the current storage unit to EXPO, and from EXPO to a new storage unit. Ray and Janet Moyer said they would start looking for a new storage unit closer to the Grapevine Convention Center. Ralph Poore said we could have the main EXPO hall until 10 PM Saturday to mark and/or repair the frames.
- **BANQUET** - Rich Hildebrandt reviewed our earlier decision to have Prime Rib, with tickets costing \$25.
- **BEGINNER'S TABLE** - Skip Ely said he saw no problem in moving the Beginner's table to the foyer (it might even enhance its visibility).
- **CACHET** - Ralph Poore showed a possible example we might use.
- **CHANCE BOARD** - Ray Cartier said we need some help in reinforcing the new board. Ray Moyer offered to help.
- **FINANCE** - Judy Christmas briefly reviewed our financial status, concluding everything was on track.
- **HOSPITALITY / REGISTRATION** - Janet Moyer requested we have participant's names by September so she can prepare name tags. She agreed to also prepare the Raffle tickets for the U.S. number one stamp awarded to the club at this year's TEXPEX.
- **JUDGES** - Peter Elias reviewed the three judges who have accepted our invitation to EXPO.
- **LUNCHESES** - Judy Christmas said she was exploring ways to facilitate the lunch orders with Jason's Deli.
- **MIX PICK** - Bob Weidman said he had found some additional locations to obtain stamps for the table.
- **MAIL OUT** - Stanley Christmas said he wanted to continue offering additional Gift Certificates for people participating in the October envelope stuffing.

Hoverspeed

On the 19th of August, 1991, I found myself in Calais, France (along with a family member, an old friend and a college buddy). As we were pondering what to do for dinner, the thought was: "let's go over to Dover" !



Since Calais was a port of landing for the Hovercraft operated by Hoverspeed, we bought some round-trip tickets to Dover. We had driven to Calais (via Amsterdam, starting off in Frankfurt originally), but decided to leave our cars in Calais and proceeded to be "walk on" passengers. We left near dusk. Cars drive into the middle of the Hovercraft, while people are seated on either side in aircraft style seating.

I'm one of those people that saves tickets from my travels, as they add nicely to photo albums later. Above is the ticket stub for our ride (Elias is in the lower left-hand corner). Unlike an aircraft though, there was no real "security", we just walked on board, just as cars simply drove onto the hovercraft. It was definitely an interesting ride across the English channel !

After taking a bus from the "Hoverport" to Dover, we then proceeded to walk around Dover a bit and had dinner in an English pub. Getting back to Calais was a bit different though.



Our ride back was on a large twin-hulled catamaran that had 20,000 horsepower engines; it was an interesting high speed ride back to Calais.

Hoverspeed ceased operations in 2005. Hovercraft were very expensive to operate. Most cross-Channel traffic now is via the "Chunnel" underneath. The end of an era, at least I got to experience it!



News from the Internet

In a previous article I had mentioned that US Postal Service uses "Zones" in some cases to determine the postage rate, such as when using the "Regional Rate" flat-rate boxes. The Zip Code that you are mailing from and to will determine the Zone. One of the USPS authorized postage vendors, Endicia, has a website that gives you a visual map of the zones that pertain to you (i.e.: your own zip code). You can access this site here: <http://apps.endicia.com/apps/zonemap> . A representative Zone map for the USA based on my own Zip Code of 75094 looks like this:



The USPS itself has a similar site located at: <https://postcalc.usps.com/DomesticZoneChart>. The USPS, however, represent the Zones in a table format such as the cropped screenshot shown below:

Been There, Done That

Verona, Italy

On our 2013 trip to Italy, one of the places we stopped was Verona. The city is located in northern Italy, between Milan and Venice.

In the picture, Pat is standing in front of the Madonna Fountain. It is located in the middle of Piazza Erba in Verona and was built way back in the year 1368 by Cansignorio with marble taken from the ancient Roman forum and thermal baths. It was erected to celebrate the building of an aqueduct that supplied water to Verona from Aresa's low river.

The stamp is Italy Scott #1252 that pictures the fountain and was issued on December 21, 1976.
