Been There, Done That

Dachshunds

Dachshunds, affectionately known as "wiener dogs" were developed in Germany during the 18th and 19th centuries combining several breeds of dogs. Dachshund is German for "badger hound". They were bred for hunting badgers, but



also used to hunt rabbits, boars, hares, foxes, ermines and even deer.

There are three different coat types and two sizes of dachsies. The smooth-haired; the long-haired, which may have been bred with spaniels, and the wire-haired that crossed smooth-haired with terriers and wire-haired pinschers.

The two sizes are the standard, that weigh from 16 to 32 pounds and the miniatures that weigh up to 11 pounds. Those inbetween are fondly known as "tweenies"!

My first exposure to dachshunds was when my younger sister got one from an aunt whose dog had puppies. Pat's family had a dachshund when I met her. After we were married a couple of years, we bought our first house and got our first dachshund, who we called Moe. He was a smooth-haired brown in color. After about a year, we got our second dachsie, who we named Heidi. She was also smooth-haired, but a lighter

shade of brown.

After we moved to North Carolina, we got Wrinkles, also smooth-haired, but a dark reddish brown color. Princess was next. She was smooth-haired, but jet black in color with just a tad of tan around her mouth, on her paws and under her tail.



When we moved to Texas,

we got Penny, also smooth-haired and black & tan. The second picture has Chippy, a smooth-haired who is chocolate and tan. I never knew there were chocolate dachshunds until we got him.

Dachshunds are one of the most popular breeds of dogs.

Some of that credit goes to Queen Victoria of Great Britain who owned a dachshund given to her by her consort, Prince Albert of Saxe-Goethe.

The stamp pictured is Antigua & Barbuda Scott Nr. 2215, issued December 10, 1998. It shows a longhaired black & tan dachsie.



Mid-Cites Stamp Club Dues Notice & Stamping Around Update

It is that time of year again to start thinking about renewing your MCSC membership. At the Board & EXPO meeting in August 20, 2016, it was agreed that the Club will charge members extra if they want a printed copy of the Newsletter each month (starting in 2017).

The Club was looking for a way to recover some of the expense for printing out a newsletter each month and this was what they came up with. So starting with the 2017 membership renewal notice in next month's newsletter, there will be a little difference in the pricing of your dues.

If you do not want a newsletter to be mailed to you then your dues will stay at \$12 or \$18 for a couple. The youth membership will also stay the same. But if you want a printed copy of the newsletter mailed to you then you will need to add \$10 to your dues. Thus, single Club member dues would be \$22 and for a couple it would be \$28 and for a Youth it would be \$16.

You can still be a Sponsor member for \$25 but if you want your printed copy of the newsletter then you would need to pay \$35 for a Sponsor membership. For those of you who choose not to receive a printed copy of the newsletter you will receive an e-mail from the Club with an attachment that will have the newsletter [*Editor: this will require that you have a PDF reader installed*]. The deadline for all dues is the end of March. For those who have not made their dues payment by then will not be receiving any more newsletters nor will they be listed as Club members in the Handbook. Dues are due by the 31st of December as stated in your handbook. Renewal will appear in the newsletter starting with the October newsletter.

It happens on occasion: I just printed a page for the newsletter and then discover a typo! So if you have ever noticed a minor discrepancy between the printed versus download version of the newsletter, now you know why!

A quick glance at my spreadsheet of "philatelic articles" published in this newsletter since 1973 shows that there have been (as of last month), 1,022 philatelic related articles published! And that is NOT counting the articles that are about general club-related matters such as meeting & BOD minutes, pleas for volunteers, etc!

You can read ALL of these 1,022+ articles if you are a dues paying member of the club AND are signed up with the Mid-Cities Stamp Club "YahooGroup"! A few months ago I finished uploading all known newsletters to that site and they are stored in the "Files" section by year, and then individual PDF files for each issue. Issues that came out prior to my tenure as editor are from "scanned" copies, those that I edited were simply converted into PDF files from the Microsoft Publisher original files (and thus also of higher quality).

Also, next year the dues will increase for those members that opt for getting a mailed copy; see separate article.

Show & Tell:

- Geoff Owens passed around the program for the APS Stamp Show he attended in Portland a couple of weeks ago. He also had some other items, including a tote bag that he donated as a door prize.
- Jack Urish had a question about a U.S. Civil Censorship Cancel he had on a cover from Munich. He also passed around a German Germania booklet of 5, 10, and 15 pf stamps he recently purchased. He also showed a stamp from Norway with a circled "T" that Jim Myers said was a postage due mark.
- Ken Wills passed around a recent newsletter of the International Society of World Wide Stamp Collectors and encouraged anyone interested to join.
- Stanley Christmas talked a little about his interest in Pitcairn Island stamps.

<u>Door Prizes:</u> Gift Certificates were awarded to Ken Wills and Stanley Christmas. Mike Smith was the recipient of the APS tote bag.

Minutes of the MCSC Board Meeting August 20, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 11:00 AM by President Mike Smith. Present were Ralph Poore, Skip Ely, Stanley Christmas, Judy Christmas, Bob Weidman, Ray Moyer, Janet Moyer, Ken Wills, Ben Termini, Tom Cunningham, Peter Elias, Rich Hildebrandt, Ray Cartier, Alliene Franklin, and Mike Smith.

The minutes of the previous board meeting were approved.

Reports:

- The Secretary (Ben Termini) reported that we had 106 members.
- The Treasurer (Judy Christmas) reported that we had adequate funds (See discussion of budget below).
- Newsletter editor Peter Elias reported that the newsletter was in good shape.
- Sales Book Chairman Skip Ely passed out a sales book summary sheet and said we had made a small profit so far this year.

New Business:

- The budget for next year was presented by the treasurer, Judy Christmas. The major budget increases were the cost of printing the newsletter and the rental of a climate controlled storage unit.
- 2. Peter Elias reported that many members were requesting printed copies of the newsletter, even though most members had email addresses and could receive it electronically. (Secretary's note added later: We have 12 members without email addresses). Considerable funds could be saved by sending it electronically to all members who have email.
- 3. After considerable discussion, a motion was made by Janet Moyer, and seconded by Ken Wills, that: "All members who had email addresses would receive the newsletter electronically as a file attachment to an email. Those who wished to receive a printed copy would be charged ten dollars per year additional. This would be effective as of January 1, 2017." It passed with unanimous approval.
- A discussion of other ways that the club could save money was held. Janet Moyer (seconded by Stanley Christmas) moved that the budget be accepted and approved. This motion passed.
- Stanley Christmas, chairman of the nominating committee, reported that members had agreed to fill most of the positions which would be open starting in January 2017. The positions of President and First Vice President were still unfilled.
- 6. The Irving meeting site was discussed and various possible locations considered. No final decision was made.
- Putting basic information in the member handbook on the website was discussed and it was pointed out that much of this had already been posted. President Mike Smith will discuss this further with Jim Myers.


- 8. Ray Cartier discussed the Chautauqua which is being held in Waxahachie on September 24th. The theme is "Water" and Ray passed around a cover with a cachet he had designed and stated that he had prepared a two-frame exhibit on water which would be shown. Ken Wills proposed that Ray be given a vote of thanks for his efforts.
- 9. Stanley Christmas proposed that the club purchase the book, "The Path to Gold" by Steven Zwillinger, and this was approved.
- A brief discussion was held concerning bringing one of the annual APS winter shows to Arlington, possibly in conjunction with TEXPEX.
- 11. Ray Cartier mentioned that Karen Cartier had completed a new book on stories on stamps and asked if it could be sold at the registration desk at the Mid-Cities Expo. This was approved. The club will receive a donation from Karen for each copy sold.

EXPO Meeting:

After a short break, Ralph Poore led a discussion of plans for the Mid-Cities EXPO, including publicity, cachets, dealer bourse, chance board, exhibits, finances, mixture pick, beginners' table, registration and hospitality, the Penny Black raffle, security and the silent auction.

Next Meetings:

- The next meeting of the EXPO committee will be on September 10th at 11 AM at the Pizza Garden Restaurant.
- The next general Board Meeting (which will also include an Expo Committee Meeting) will be on Saturday, January 28, 2017 at 11 AM at the Pizza Garden Restaurant.

Stamp of the Month: The Italian poet Dante Alighieri lived from 1265 to 1321. He is also known as the father of the Italian language because his best known literary masterpiece, *Divine Comedy*, was written in his Tuscan dialect instead of Latin, making it the first great work of poetry from the Middle Ages accessible to a wider, less educated audience. Italy Scott

Nr. 133-135 were issued in September 1921 on the 600th anniversary of his death and a later series from 1965, Italy Scott Nr. 917-920, includes illustrations of his manuscripts. Other stamps honoring Dante include USA Scott Nr. 1268 and Germany Scott Nr. 1073, which appears to be based on a profile from the Early Renaissance painter Sandro Botticelli.

Every time that I look at the above numbers, I am amazed how "large" they've gotten after 15 years of editing this newsletter! Some of the numbers and costs would be much higher if it wasn't for the fact that right now there only about 57 copies of the newsletter that are mailed against a membership of 106. In 2011, 120 newsletters were mailed each month, dropping to about 80 in 2012 and eventually sliding down to the 57 now. I do encourage all to get the download version of the newsletter rather than the mailed one, as it will save the club money (it costs over \$14 to mail a newsletter to one member compared to the \$12 membership fee) and also save me more time and effort as well!

Some of the costs above are reduced though by income from the business card ads from the dealers, which have generated approximately \$180-\$240 per year for the club. However, since I'm only counting the actual re-imbursements that I have received, the costs above would have been higher if taking into account the left-over postage from EXPO mail-outs and \$850 in postage from the Werry estate (which resulted in 26 months of free postage!).

Notes:

- * In 2009, 2010 & 2013 there were only 11, not 12 issues, since I had to combine 2 issues in the summers.
- ** I switched to using a different laser printer several years ago which uses different cartridges and has different capacities. As a side note, if an inkjet printer would have been used to print this newsletter, the printing costs would be almost triple or more (and take 6 20 times as long to print)!
 - *** Creating each monthly newsletter includes:
- Typing, editing, formatting & proof-reading articles submitted by others.
- Researching & writing my own articles.
- Scanning and/or photographing items for illustrations.
- Printing the newsletter (currently about 600 pages per month, which is down from 1,200 several years ago!).
- Collating (ranging from 5 to 8 stacks of paper for each newsletter), folding & stapling the newsletter (2 staples per newsletter). Basically the routine is: [shuffle/shuffle/shuffle/shuffle/shuffle/fold/ staple/staple] times 58); this assembly task takes about 1 hour each month.
- Applying postage (approx. 58 times each month; 118 times if using the 2 ounce rate); this task takes 20 30 minutes each month.

Granbury Meeting Minutes July 26, 2016

Seventeen members and guests assembled at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 25, for the monthly meeting of the Lake Granbury Branch, Mid-Cities Stamp Club. Host David Stockbridge welcomed the group to the Bentwater Activities Center, 1800 W. Emerald Bend Ct., in Granbury, Texas. In the SHOW AND TELL portion of the evening, Stanley Christmas asked information on why a Richmond, Virginia, precancel would be used on a cover from Palestine to the United States. Daniel Kennedy showed off a Princess Diana cover, Gene Atkinson called attention to the classic U.S. stamps sheet released at the New York Stamp Show, Denny Ludlow had a lot of worldwide maximum cards, and Dave Stockbridge showed a "return to sender" cover rejected for its involvement with the purchase of Australian lottery tickets.

In a PHILATELIC MOMENT, Dr. Ken Jones offered tips to collectors who might be victims of stamp thefts. Police, he noted, might not be familiar with such items and require special consideration and details. Notify the APS, he continued, and in some cases even the FBI. Stamps, he said, were "portable and negotiable" and thus attractive to thieves. Stanley Christmas added that the Texas Stamp Dealers Association should be notified so that their members might be aware of material offered to them for sale.

In other ANNOUNCEMENTS, Brian Smith and Denny Ludlow had some items for sale; a table was set aside for recent periodicals that members might claim; Alliene Franklin is still collecting donations for the "Mystery Box" for this year's EXPO in Grapevine, and Brian Smith is accepting items for the new collectors table in Grapevine. Stanley Christmas announced that the Mid-Cities Club is recruiting officers for next year, and Dave Stockbridge reminded members that the exhibit theme for the club's entry in TEXPEX will be stamps "Whupped wi' de Ugly Stick." He needs specific page titles and names in December. He also announced program subjects for meetings the rest of 2016.

For the BREAK, Al Hull offered what he called his "Harvey Wallbanger" cake, a delicious amalgam of fruit, cake and frosting.

Gary McNamee brought the PROGRAM, an introduction to websites of particular interest to philatelists. Referring to a multipage handout, he highlighted the work of the American Philatelic Society in its extensive offerings for the enjoyment and use of collectors. Other resources included the USPS website, linns.com, Mystic Stamp Co. links, stamp news now, and freestampcatalog.com.

In CLOSING, Daniel Kennedy and Judy Christmas won gift certificates as door prizes, and David Stockbridge won a packet of worldwide stamps.

Using "lick-n-stick" rather than self-adhesive stamps makes this task even longer.


- Dropping the newsletter off at the nearest post office (10 mile round-trip) takes about 25 minute round-trip.

382.7 Foreign International Business Reply Service

Mailers in every country and territorial possession in the world that is a destination point for U.S.-originating international mail may be authorized to distribute IBHS mail in the United States. These items similar to the format in Exhibit 382.7 are accepted without the prepayment of postage for return by air to the destination country. These items are forwarded with ordinary letters and cards to the designated international air exchange office for return to the appropriate country.

Format Requirements — Foreign IBRS



I brought the envelope shown to left to the Plano post office for mailing. The clerk said it needed postage. I said no, it says "no postage required" as it was an "international business reply" envelope and that postage would be paid in Switzerland by Swiss Post. He said "no", all overseas mail would have to have postage prepaid. I told him it was a proper IBRS (International Business Reply Service) item according to the USPS' own regulations.

Regulation #382.7 in the USPS IMM (International Mail

Manual) specifically says that no pre-payment is required and even gives an example of a very similar envelope (shown above in the cropped screen shot from the USPS webpage at http://pe.usps.com/text/imm/immc3 021.htm). I even showed him the print-out of the USPS webpage to prove the point, but he was adamant about me not mailing it without paying postage first.

The supervisor I finally spoke with corroborated my side and I was able to mail this envelope. She did say though that I shouldn't have written "Switzerland" at the bottom of the address (as it only said "Schweiz", and I figured I'd be helpful by putting in the English translation).

True, this is not the kind of item that postal clerks see often, and thus probably don't know about, but I'm always amazed that they won't even accept proof of their own employer's rules when presented with them. I guess it's an attitude thing about "well, I work for the USPS, so you can't tell me to do my own job". As a stamp collector, I often peruse the DMM (domestic mail manual) and the IMM just to make that I understand the USPS rules and regulations; it's surprising that I often end up knowing more about certain rules than they do! The reason I had to mail this envelope was that Swiss Post inexplicably decided to (all of a sudden) switch their correspondence and magazine from the usual English version to the French version and "je ne lis pas français".
