### Been There, Done That

### Tikal

Back in 1997, Pat and I took a trip to Belize, the former British colony of British Honduras, which is located in Central America. We had heard some very positive things about Belize and decided to check it out for ourselves. It was all true!

While we were there, we had the opportunity to take a day trip over to Tikal, Guatemala. Tikal, located in the rainforest of northern Guatemala is the site of the largest Mayan city in the Americas. It dates back to the first century and its heyday was between 200 and 850 AD.

To get there, we had to take a small puddle jumper of a plane from Ambergris Cay, off the coast of Belize to the main airport in Belize City. There we change to another puddle jumper that took us to Tikal. The plane was so small that we actually sat on the floor in the very back! When we got to the airport in Tikal, we met with our guide who took us and another couple on a tour of the area.

In the picture, the pyramid that I am standing in front of is the Temple of the Grand Jaguar, which is one of the tallest pre-Columbian structures in the Americas. That same pyramid is shown the Guatemalan stamp to the left, Scott #C579 that was issued on June 4, 1976.



## It Doesn't Work As A Stamp

Have a look at the two US stamps above. They are SA #2980 (Women's Suffrage, issued in 1995) and #3338 (Frederick Law Olmsted, issued in 1999). So, what do you notice? I don't know about you, but I get a headache and strained eyeballs looking at these two stamps!



Enlarging this design finally makes a few more things easily visible, such as, oh yeah, there's some people marching and carrying signs (2 separate photos actually), the letters "PROGRESS" on two lines, the US Capitol, some trees, etc ...

The problem with these "collage" designs is that there are just way too many visuals present and it all kind of gets lost on a "postage stamp size". I'm sure this looks great on a 3 x 4 foot poster or a projection screen, but not an actual 1.5" wide stamp... Same goes with the Olmsted stamp.

Another stamp that crams way too many visuals into the design is USA #3813, issued for Washington DC. It features a map, some row house, a picture of the Capitol & the Washington monument and flowers; all in the space of just over an inch.

As far as I'm concerned, keep the designs "simple"! While full color and lots of details are great, it doesn't always work with all designs! Most modern stamp designs are created using computer screens where the images that are quite a bit larger than the final product, something I think some stamp designers seem to forget!

## Lithographed vs. Engraved

I was going through a pile of South African stamps the other day, and ran across these two:



At first, they look identical (other than the square "black dot" in the white space on the middle right side of the right stamp, highlighted with a blue circle). The left stamp above is Scott #597 issued in 1983 and the right stamp is #583 issued in 1985 (how a later issued stamp got a lower catalog number is beyond me). Both stamps have a 1 1982 date in the lower right corner though.

The left stamp (#597) is engraved while #583 is lithographed. So how do you tell them apart? Simple: use your fingernail. Rub the fingernail across the tower, you'll feel the difference between the unprinted white portion as it transitions to the tower design. On the lithographed stamps, you'll feel nothing, as if it's the surface is the same, while on the engraved stamps, the design has "ridges".



Another way is putting the stamp at an angle against light. The top stamp is the engraved version, and the printed areas seem to absorb light (top) a bit more, since the paper reflects the light while the black is dull. The ink on the lithographed version seems to reflect light more, similar to the paper, but in this case, the test that works the best was the fingernail across the surface.

There are several other stamps in this same architecture series that are also available in both engraved and lithographed versions.

**The Hohentwiel**



Five times now have I trekked up to the Hohentwiel ! What is the Hohentwiel you may ask? It is an extinct volcano in southern Germany on which a fortress was built around the year 914.

The Hohentwiel is located in Hilzingen, a small village on the west side of the Hohentwiel, and on the east side is the city of Singen; all of which are only a few miles to the Swiss border.




In early February 1986, I was sent to a sister company located in Singen to work on manufacturing technology transfer to our new plant that was being built in Kentucky. I spent about 2 weeks there and got a chance to go visit the castle; later that year I took some American visitors there as well while stationed in Kreuzlingen, about 30 miles away, at another sister company. In 2010, my wife and I went up there just to find out it was already closed that day and came back the next day, and in 2013 when enroute to Switzerland, we stopped by there, staying at a lovely local family owned Hotel, the Laurentiushof (located in the hillside in the center of the photo above) and from which you have a great view of the


**Have A Ball !**

“Have A Ball” is a series of 8 stamps issued on June 14, 2017 by the USPS, commemorating various ball-related sports that are popular: football, volleyball, soccer, golf, baseball, basketball, tennis & kickball.

Football is sort of the “oddball” here (pun intended), since it’s only really a ball in the traditional sense (i.e.: same diameter no matter how you look at it).



These stamps also feature a special clear “textured coating” printed on top of the various graphic elements on the stamps (such as along the seam lines of each ball). You have to hold the stamps tilted at an angle against a light source to best view this texture.

The stamps come in panes of 16 with 100 panes to a “pad”. Inside each shrink-wrapped pad, on top of the stamp panes, is a “deck card”, that advises USPS personnel to not sell it before the published first day. These deck pads are usually thrown away by the clerks unless you happen to be there when a pad is unwrapped and plead, “pretty please” and they might let you have it. In this case, I was able to get it postmarked on the first day of issue as well (although the official first day city was in Hartford, WI at the 117th U.S. Open Championship).

## President's Comments

As most of you are aware, there will not be a TEXPEX 2018 and if there is to be a TEXPEX 2019 or beyond, it will need new replacement leadership. Those who have been handling this only *World Series of Philately* show in Texas have reached that time when they need to retire and turn the workings over to new people who are willing to step up and lend a hand to the hobby.

One of the innovations of TEXPEX over the past three years that was really enjoyable was the competitions by ten clubs in and around Texas with their competitions of single page club exhibits. People who had never thought of, or actually shunned any type of exhibiting put together single pages of interesting material to show each year. The club's frame that was voted to be best (and probably the most popular) won a significant prize. The Mid-Cities Club didn't win this award in the first year, but several of our members did center around a central theme and we won this award in each 2015 and 2016.

This was too good of an idea to let it die away and I propose that for the year 2017, the MCSC pick up the flag and have another club competition for one page exhibits. This has introduced many to the wonderful world of exhibiting and I am asking our club's Board of Directors to discuss this suggestion by email now, so that if we want to go through with it, we can notify clubs in time for many of them to participate.

But as for our club, there is no reason why we can't do this again on our own and thus I am asking you, our members, to really try to add to our show by participating in our assembling a frame of single page exhibits. Since we won the last two by having a single topical thread, I propose this as a theme: "Things I Love". This is not necessarily just romantic themes. It can be a sport: baseball, football; golfing; racing etc. It can be pets: dogs, cats, hamsters, gold fish, snakes. It can be things you like to do or see: a favorite vacation spot or activity; photography (you can put a few stamps along with your own photos in the frame); or possibly bowling; or going to the movies or just a favorite movie; here I'm thinking of "Gone With the Wind" where there is a stamp for the movie, another stamp showing Clark Gable & Vivian Lea plus other stamps showing confederate and union soldiers or Sherman; history such as airplanes; old autos; art; singers; movie characters; singers; actors; country artists; horse racing; musical plays; Christmas; Christ; the Madonna; presidents; the American Flag; exploration; various means of transportation; bird watching; animals seen at the Ft. Worth Zoo or in the wild etc, etc, etc.

It's easy and it's fun to see something that you created up in a frame for others to see. It does not cost money and it takes very little time to put a single page together. And if you need assistance, you can ask Peter, Stanley, Ben or me to help you out. What it does do for you is bring you closer into the Mid-Cities Stamp Club as an active member. You won't be competing as an individual only because we can refine the frame and use it in the next TEXPEX if there is one, or maybe even send all 16 pages to another national show where others are emulating the idea. Come on and try it, and let's get a frame together for our EXPO!

## Sun Yat-Sen Memorial Hall

## News from the Internet

On October 10, 1961, the United States issued a commemorative postage stamp, Scott#1188, honoring Sun Yat-Sen, the Chinese physician, writer, philosopher, calligrapher, revolutionary and first president of the Chinese Republic. Sun Yat-Sen was credited with overthrowing the Manchu dynasty of China in 1911 and establishing the republic.

He was born into a peasant household on November 12, 1866 in Choyhung, in Kwangtung, China. In 1879, he joined his brother in Hawaii and enrolled in college where he studied Western science and Christianity. He graduated in 1882. He traveled to Hong Kong in 1893 more interested in politics than medicine. He believed the government of the Manchu dynasty to be corrupt, inefficient and unable to defend itself against foreign powers.

Sun Yat-Sen died on March 12, 1925. In Guangzhou, China in 1929, construction on the octagon shaped Sun Yat-Sen or Zhongshan Memorial Hall was started. It was completed in October of 1931.

In August of 2004, on our trip to the Far East, we took the train from Hong Kong up to Guangzhou, China. In the picture is a statue of Sun Yat-Sen in front of the Memorial Hall named after him. The second picture has Pat, myself and our nephews Adam and Louis outside the front entrance to the hall.




Getting new issues directly from the source (i.e.: country in question) is generally less expensive than ordering from a "new issue" stamp dealer (since they have to mark up the items to be able to earn a living from this activity). Buying from a new issue dealer is generally much easier than ordering from a country directly. Some countries don't have good online infrastructure to make ordering easy (and generally they only take credit cards, not US-based personal checks).

For the past few years, several postal administrations have joined "WOPA" (World Online Philatelic Agency) that allows you to order new issues at face value and with minimal postage charges (credit cards are required). The countries currently participating are: Aland, Alderney, Andorra, Austria, Azores, Belgium, Bosnia & Herzegovina, Croatia, Curacao, Denmark, Dutch Caribbean, Estonia, Faroe Islands, Finland, France, Gibraltar, Greenland, Great Britain, Guernsey, Hungary, Iceland, Isle of Man, Israel, Jersey, Krygystan, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Madeira, Maldives, Malta, Monaco, Netherlands, Netherlands Antilles, Norway, Portugal, Romania, Slovenia, Spain, Sint Maarten, Sweden, Switzerland and the United Nations.

Several of these countries also have great online portals for ordering directly (such as Liechtenstein & Switzerland), but apparently being on WOPA allows them to reach more people! To check it out, go to: <http://wopa-stamps.com>.

If you don't want have new foreign stamp issues shipped in from overseas, there are still a couple of dealers that specialize in "new issues". The one I order from most frequently is Bombay Stamps, reachable at <http://bombaystamps.com> out of New Jersey. His "new issues" go back to approximately 2002.

In searching for some postal code information, I stumbled across a website that lets you find postal codes for 3 million locations around the world. To check it out, go to <http://www.postalcode.co/>.

## Topical of the Month: Pick A Phobia

A recent letter written to Marilyn vos Savant and published in the Parade magazine (Sunday newspaper insert) about Fear of Bridges (gephyrophobia) made me wonder about other phobias (fears) and whether these could be applied to a topical or thematic stamp collection or even exhibit?



What came to mind was this mini-sheetlet from Switzerland showing an airplane that is about to nosedive into the town plaza! If I was in that plane at that moment, you betcha that aerophobia or aviophobia [fear of flying] would be kicking in right about then! Why so many stamps seem to feature airplanes in this precarious position is unknown to me?

What about other phobias, such as the aforementioned geophyrophobia?
