Sesquicentennial of 1869 Pictorial Issue

March, 2019 marks the 150th anniversary of the issue of the first United States stamps featuring pictures of something other than dead politicians. This series of stamps (Scott Nos. 112-122) was issued by the American Bank Note Company during the first weeks of the administration of Ulysses S. Grant, and is prized by collectors as beautiful examples of the art of engraving on a small scale.



At the time of their issue, these stamps proved to be unpopular with the public and were withdrawn from sale after just one year. In 1875, a limited number were reissued without grills. The four higher value stamps in this series represent the first time more than one color was used in the printing process. The bi-color printing process proved troublesome for the American Bank Note Company, as several inverts are known to exist in these issues, and command quite a premium on the stamp market.



1869 Inverts

Public opinion against the pictorial issue caused the Post Office to revert to the old practice of using deceased founding fathers as subjects on stamps and pictorials were not used again until 1893 when the post office issued the Columbian Exposition stamps.

Some of the lower denomination pictorial issue stamps can still be found on cover at decent prices through local stamp dealers, at stamp shows and even online at eBay or other popular auction sites. The higher values of the pictorial issue have continued to rise in price over the last few years and now adding them to your collection will come at a premium price, but there are always deals out there, so keep looking!

TV Philately: The Little Drummer Girl

Recently, John le Carre's book "The Little Drummer Girl" was made into a mini-series that was shown on the AMC network. The movie is about a Palestinian assassin that is targeting prominent Israelis. An English actress is recruited by the Israelis to infiltrate the assassin cell.

At one point, the Palestinians are shown forging a Swiss date canceler (#1 above) to use on a letter (#2).

The postmark that is shown is a pretty good forgery (#3), however, the stamp that is shown on the envelope is non-existent. An easy clue is this: the stamp appears to be a semi-postal (with an 80+40 denomination). There is no such semi-postal design, and ALL Swiss semi-postal are inscribed either as "Pro Patria" or "Pro Juventute"! I don't know whether the 5-digit Jerusalem postal code of 91110 is correct; Israel currently (after 2013) uses a 7-digit postal code.

So "did they get it right"? Well, the postmark is a forgery, but it is supposed to be! The Swiss stamp on the other hand is a total fabrication (although the rate in 1979 was 80 centimes if I remember correctly).

Pass the Porcupine Please

On February 15, 2019, POS Malaysia, a postal service based in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, announced the release of Malaysia's first Exotic Foods themed postage stamps. The stamps will feature three different popular native dishes including sea cucumber salad, turmeric fried grasshoppers, and porcupine steak and rendang. For the uninitiated, rendang is a preparation of various meats, usually beef, cooked in a spice paste and coconut milk and is considered quite a delicacy in some parts of the world.

Unfortunately, POS Malaysia did not realize the impact that releasing a stamp featuring porcupine rendang would have on the rest of the population, especially those who consider it inappropriate to promote a dish which features an animal whose existence is threatened. The Wildlife Conservation Act of 2010 lists the Malayan Porcupine, and the Brush-tailed porcupine as "Protected", and the Long-tailed porcupine as "Totally Protected". What this means is that the first two (Protected) are legal to hunt with a permit, while with the third (Totally Protected), hunting is banned altogether. The former two fall under a classification which allows them to be hunted by aboriginal Malaysians without a permit.

As animal lover outrage escalates among the rest of the world, POS Malaysia's head of the philately unit, Diyana Lean Abdullah, proudly said, "There were actually many exotic foods in our list, but we're confident the ones we've chosen are unique and enjoyed by many." On February 16, POS Malaysia issued an apology to animal lovers. In their statement, POS Malaysia said its intention was to highlight the variety of uncommon delicacies served in Malaysia, and was not meant to encourage the act of hunting exotic animals.

Now, when I was a kid (way too many years ago), I used to really enjoy the taste of rabbits and squirrels which were plentiful in the woods of Virginia and North Carolina, and, to this day, I still consider the taste of squirrel fried up in brown gravy as one of my favorite culinary delights. But, even I have my limitations, especially when it comes to a threatened species. So you won't be hearing me say "Pass the Porcupine please"!

Apollo 7 & 8 at 50 Years

The first manned Apollo launch was Apollo 7, which was launched on the Saturn 1B rocket into Earth orbit, with a crew that was comprised of Walter Schirra, who had flown in space earlier in Project Mercury as the third American to orbit the Earth, and on the Gemini 6 mission. He was the only astronaut to have flown on all three of the original US manned space programs. Flying with him were rookies, Walter Cunningham and Donn Eisele. None of the three ever flew again. They tested the Apollo capsules handling in Earth orbit.

Apollo 8 was originally set up to test docking and undocking maneuvers in Earth orbit. However, the Soviets were completed tests on their gigantic N-2 rocket and NASA decided that they had to launch men to orbit the Moon before the Russians did.

With that in mind the Apollo 8 crew of Frank Borman, James Lovell and rookie, Bill Anders, were launched by the much larger Saturn V rocket to the moon. Both Borman and Lovell had flown Gemini missions and Anders was a rookie. Only Lovell went on to fly again later on the ill-fated Apollo 13 flight.

The Saturn V lifted off with a vibrating staccato of noise which allowed visitors in the VIP stands to practically feel the outlines of their lungs as the monster rocket slowly lifted off



the pad. This writer experienced this wonderful experience from the VIP site a few years later with the Apollo 16 launch.



NASA had started a new public relations experiment with the attendees at the VIP site each received 5 one color printed postcards with each of the Apollo flights. Three 8-foot tables were set up in the grass to the left of the viewing stands where souvenirs and postage stamps were sold. Because only rarely were collectors the recipients of these cards, it is extremely difficult to find these in a postally used condition, with postmarks on the date of the event from the Kennedy Space Center. It took me over 20 years to find examples of each.



Apollo 8 lifted off flawlessly on December 21, 1968 and the mission was peculiarly similar to Jules Verne's launch of the Columbiad in December of possibly 1868 in his book,

In my last few letters I have been highlighting the contributions of several of our outstanding members. They have been wonderful resources for the club and continue to be so. This month I want to point out another club resource, the club library. While it is not the Wineburgh, it is available to all MSCS members and contains many useful reference materials. It is housed in a closet in the Arlington meeting room. This does not mean that you need to attend the Arlington meetings to avail yourself of these resources. Several members attend the Arlington meeting and also the Granbury and /or Eules meeting. I know that they would be more than willing to checkout an item and bring it to the appropriate meeting if you made the request.

The primary items checked out are the Scott catalogs. The club maintains two years worth of these catalogs, the US Specialized and also the now 12 book worldwide set. There are many other useful books such as the APS judging manual, other catalogs, APS magazines, ATA booklets, etc. There should be a relatively complete list on our club website. Since I have moved over to the position of president, Janet Moyer has assumed the duties of librarian. Please contact her if you have specific questions as to the availability of materials.

At a recent BOD meeting we approved a change to what Scott catalogs we will purchase each year. They are a relatively expensive item and the usage has declined in the last few years. We now plan on purchasing the worldwide set every other year, with the US Specialized in the alternate years. We will now also purchase a Scott Classic Specialized catalog, as many members concentrate on the older worldwide stamps. Future purchases of this catalog will be determined by the amount of use that it gets.

One last reminder, bring your lots for the Arlington May meeting to our April meeting. Skip will be collecting them and organizing the auction. If you are unable to make the April meeting and wish to submit items please contact Skip for alternate arrangements.

“From the Earth to the Moon”. In both, three men were launched in vehicles of similar materials, size, and shapes, from the coast of Florida on a trip to the moon. Verne stated that his imaginary crew had to attain a speed of 25,000 miles per hour to escape Earth's gravity. Apollo 8 escaped at 24,000 miles per hour. Both crews experienced weightlessness and both fired rockets to be able to be captured in lunar orbit. Both fired retro rockets to break out of orbit and both splashed down in the Pacific Ocean where they were recovered by US war ships. Oddly enough, the two splashdown sites were only 2 1/2 miles apart!

A clue to the reason for this was a quote by von Braun which appeared in newspapers on the date of the Apollo 8 lunar launch: All of the great pioneers of Space: Tsiolkovskyy, Oberth and Goddard – had one thing in common: imaginations sparked by Jules Verne.

Werner von Braun also read Jules Verne and consciously or not he followed the Verne's blueprint of 100 years earlier.

Port Louis

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



February 23, 2019 was the first day of issue of a stamp that commemorates Alabama's Bicentennial of its Statehood. The issue date was on a Saturday, and I was fortunate enough to make it to the Plano post office before they close at noon (I was there about 11:55 AM!) and got them to unwrap the stamp "deck" and I was thus able to get the "deck card" and one of the stamps which I had postmarked, thus giving me a "First Day Cancel" (even though the official first day city was at the Early Works Children's Museum in Huntsville, Alabama).

Usually pads or decks of stamps hold 100 panes. In this case, only 50 panes were present (1,000 stamps), perhaps since they're not expecting individual post offices to sell that many of these stamps.

Ok, so how does this stamp relate to me? Well, I have been to Alabama 4 times between 1995 to 2005 as part of business trips to one particular client in Birmingham.

Most of my business trips are usually like this: Airport, Car Rental Counter, Client, Hotel, repeat... In other words, I usually don't get a chance to do much personally on those kind of trips. Once in a great while, the gods of philatelic scheduling are on my side, and I get to attend a local stamp club meeting, but that wasn't the case here. In December 1995, I did however get to visit the [Sloss Furnaces Historic Landmark](#) in Birmingham; this operated as a pig-iron blast furnace company from 1882 to 1971 and became one of the first industrial sites in the U.S. to be preserved and restored for public use.



Back in the mid-1990's, I only had a 35mm camera, so I had to dig out the original negatives and scan them in order to get the photo above. During the same trip, I also visited the Birmingham Museum of Art, so I must have had some spare time after visiting my client and before flying back to Dallas. Also as part of the same trip, I also went to visit a customer in Anniston, AL, and I vaguely visiting a museum there (Berman Museum) based on some of the photos that I scanned.



eBay Economics

To the right is a screen shot from eBay. The lot offers a complete set of last year's "Sparkling Holidays" Santa stamps, including the 4 stamps from the booklet, the 1-stamp souvenir sheet and the SSK (self-service kiosk) stamp, all for just \$4.75 with free shipping.



At the time of issue, all of the stamps had a face value of 50¢ (now 55¢), so the face value was \$3.00 (now \$3.30 since the forever rates went up on January 27th).

The seller is asking approximately 50% over face value, but how does that really pan out for the seller?

The above assumes the standard eBay & PayPal fees (such as what I am charged). Adding the cost of an envelope (5¢) and extra postage fee if using a stiffener (15¢ for non-machinable rate)) would reduce the "profit" to 26¢. Seems like a lot of effort just to earn either 46¢ or 26¢ !
